
# **Guild Program for January 27, 2015**

Laura Khoury gave the membership report. We had 78 members and one visitor present at the meeting. Drawings for attendance were made.

Darla Gibson announced the Raffle Quilt top has been completed.

Chris Williams announced that more than 180 quilts have been made for Cover Our Kids program to date.

Chris recognized Southern Stitchers for their generous gifts of COK quilts. Scraps members were recognized for their wonderful donation of 28 COK quilts and 1 to the church where their group meets. Debbie Brisco was recognized for her completion of 30 quilts. Susan Calzone was recognized for her continued support and donations of quilts. Judy Humphrey, Bernice Dodge, Darla Gibson, Tracy Back and Marsha Bray were all recognized for their exceptional donations of time, talent and stash.

Many members received a guilted heart

and a piece of COK fabric from Chris. Members were asked to make a 9-patch block with that fabric and return it in January.

Darlene Sforza announced that our members have donated 27 quilts to Quilts of Valor.

Judy announced the 2015 slate of officers: President Anne Perry, Vice President Linda Waugh, Secretary Sandy Sagan, and Treasurer Jean Weber. Tracy Back moved to accept the slate and the motion was seconded. The vote was called and the slate was accepted.

Anne Perry, President-elect, addressed the members sharing her vision of volunteerism, new beginnings and giving back as our guild focus.

#### COK and More: Chris Williams

- The COK Challenge yielded 58 beautiful quilts in November. Final 2014 quilt donations in November and December have brought the final count to 310 quilts! This number now includes the COK and Challenge quilts. My heartfelt thanks to everyone who contributed to the COK program with your generous donation of time, talent, and materials to achieve such success with this program.
- A special thanks to Cindy Holten for helping me photograph each of the quilts, measure, examine and sort for sizes and appropriate recipient (baby, teen, senior). Cindy and I then bagged the guilts for distribution to the recipients.
- The December deliveries were made to the following programs: Crisis Nursery North (22); Crisis Nursery Center Centene (22); Crisis Nursery St. Charles (22); Youth in Need St. Charles (32); Epworth Home (30); Jefferson Lost & Forgotten (22); St. Louis Transitional Hope House (34). All of these agencies are most grateful for the donations and so very impressed with the beautiful, colorful quilts that they received.

#### New COK Position: Baggy Block Coordinator

- The COK program for 2015 is making some changes.
   Baggy blocks are now going to be removed as a primary responsibility of the COK Chairman. Instead each month for six months there will be a different Baggy Block Coordinator (either one person or a group) to manage the baggy blocks for that month. Baggy blocks will be available 6 or 7 months per year.
- As chairwoman, I will assist the Baggy Block Coordinator in selecting the block pattern and fabric from the COK stash. The monthly Baggy Block Coordinator will be responsible for cutting, preparing the bags with the instructions, and when the pieced blocks are returned, assembling the blocks into complete kits. Again, I will assist, but the primary responsibility will fall to the monthly Baggy Block Coordinator.
- At the November meeting I distributed fat eighths of fabric along with instructions for a 9-patch block, asking that you add a complimentary color to the fabric in the packet and requested that the blocks be turned in at the January meeting. Darla Gibson has volunteered to be the Baggy Block Coordinator for the baggy blocks returned in January.
  - The following members have volunteered to act as Baggy Block Coordinators:
    - Darla Gibson will be collecting the blocks from the November meeting.
    - Laurie Schrader will prepare the baggie blocks to be distributed at the January meeting.
    - Lisa Marsden will prepare the baggie blocks to be distributed at the February meeting.
  - Several others have volunteered and I will be contacting them soon to schedule the BB Coordinator dates for them.

- The Salem Methodist Church has been reserved for our COK sew days, which will be held from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm on the following dates:
  - Tuesday, January 20
  - Saturday, February 28
  - Saturday, March 21



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# **SOMETHING NEW**

QUILTER'S QUEST QUORNER



As quilters, we all are on a quest to find the best "How To's", that perfect notion, a great blog, or the best fabric source.

With that in mind, I have

created a new section.

Each month, I will ask a quilt-related question and then post those answers in the QQQ section. BUT...I cannot do this without your interest and responses.

Last month, I posed the question on our Yahoo group about quilt hanging systems. And I was pleasantly surprised by the many responses I received. Thanks very much, ladies. See the responses on the following page.

### QUILTER'S QUEST QUORNER

Question: What system or method do you use to hang your quilts?

I think the Hang It Dang It quilt hangers work well. It adjusts from 21" to 35" and it's very easy to use. It has a small rod that fits through your quilt's hanging sleeve. Then it snaps onto a magnet that hooks onto a single nail in the wall. It expands like a curtain rod. It supports 40 lbs. You can check it out on <a href="https://www.hangitdangit.com">www.hangitdangit.com</a>. - Donna Tharp

Hang It Dang It. I LOVE THESE!! They are self leveling and adjustable. If you go to their website they have a video that is good: <a href="https://www.hangitdangit.com">www.hangitdangit.com</a> - Lisa Marsden

For a wall size quilt, I often purchase a dowel at Home Depot or Lowes, etc, cut it to size, and screw in those tiny ring tip screws, one on each end. Then I use fishing line to hang the quilt and dowel. It only takes one small nail hole in the wall, and I usually put it high enough to be unnoticeable. The fishing line is practically invisible. If every quilt you want to hang has a sleeve, this system works well, is inexpensive, and accommodates every size quilt. - Fran Collins

I often use curtain rods with decorative finials. Sometimes if the quilt isn't as long as the rod, I add strips of wide ribbon that matches or complements the quilt on each side. For smaller quilts, I use straight pins-the kind with small silver heads. They can be "pounded" right through the quilt and leave a very tiny hole in the wall. Have used this method on a wall hanging about 18" x 48" and it works fine. Just put the pins about 6" apart. No one will see them and wonder how on earth you got it there! Happy hanging. - Ivy Osborn

I recently bought a ladder quilt rack. You can hang up to five quilts on the rungs and it displays them nicely. The size is approximately 24" wide by 5" tall. It leans against the wall so no holes in wall are required. It was ordered from a company in Illinois and took about a month to receive. There are also picture hanging wires that you could use small decorative clothes pins to hang mini quilts. (A clothes line effect.) - Judy Vogt

I have an awesome system that I purchased at the Quilted Fox for around \$55. It's a system of 5 powerful magnets that you either screw into the wall or use double sticky- sided tape to adhere to the wall. I then went to my local hardware store and purchased two long, flat, metal rods for about \$4 each and taped them together. You slip them through the rod pocket and hang. If the quilt is unevenly hung you just pull down to adjust. Super cool with no hardware showing. They are called Magnetic Invisible Quilt Hangers. - Louise Morris

I use curtain rods attached to the wall on pretty hangars. They range in size so I just adjust for the quilt I want to hang. Easy to change out and clean. - Candy Grisham

I use a decorative curtain rod and hang it with either decorative hooks or nails. Look for metal rod rather than plastic. My hooks are decorative iron ones that I had. - Nancy Peters

I use a system that I devised that uses thin wire or fishing line and a few tiny screws. It can hold a number of sized quilts with little adjustment - Carol Lovelace

I use decorative coat hooks and hang an embroidery hoop on it. Then I just thread my quilt through it. I can hang many quilts this way, and it makes for a beautiful display. - Carol Spindler
