22 October 2019

- The Fun Sew Day for November is full. The Fun Sew Day for 7 December still has openings. See Chris Williams to sign up.
- Charity Sharity has their last pickup this month until after the holidays; if you bring in stuff for the free table in November or December, you must take unwanted items back home with you.--Jean received a couple of nice thank-you notes from 2 Veterans who received Honor Flight quilts which she read at the meeting.
- Darla Gibson announced that Roxanne Jasper has been selected as the Featured Quilter at the Quilt Show. She was presented with a lovely bouquet of flowers.

Program: Margaret Gaal presented the thought process and rules established for the Quilt Challenge which was our Program for this evening.

- The Challenge consisted of 3 categories in whole cloth quilting: Hand, Sewing Machine, Long-Arm Free-Motion, and Long Arm Computer-Aided.
- The voting took place at this time. There were 5 Hand Quilted quilts, 4 Long-Arm Free-Motion quilts, 2 Long-Arm Computer-Aided quilts, and 3 Free-Motion Sewing Machine quilts in the competition. The next phase was voting on the Quilt Challenge. Votes were tallied during the break.

Nominating Committee Report:

Anne Perry and Louise Morse advised that there are openings for the following positions:

- Vice President: There is a need for a new Vice President who will be responsible for Programs. There are 6 months that are covered by existing activities throughout the year, so there is a need for only 6 local people to provide programs for the Bits Meetings in 2020. John has a big folder of ideas for the next VP.
- Secretary: There is need for a Secretary for the next 2 years. It is an easy job.
- Librarian: Kay Merz has been our librarian for several years and is stepping down; we are very appreciative of all of her efforts. Francine Boillat is taking over as librarian.

- UFO Chairman: With Francine moving on, the Guild needs a new UFO Chairman for next year.
- COK Chairmen: There is a need for new Cover Our Kids Chairmen.

Quilt Show: Darla Gibson mentioned the following items regarding the Quilt Show.

- The dates of the Quilt Show are 21-22 March 2020.
- The Volunteer list will go out in January.
- Quilts are needed from the membership at large. Each person should submit at least 2 quilts. There are registration forms available, and a color photo of each quilt needs to be attached to the registration forms. Every quilt needs to have a hanging sleeve. Every quilt needs to have a label that includes the name of the quilt, the quilter's name, and any other information that might be desired by the quilter. Quilts need to be submitted inside of a pillowcase, marked with masking tape with the name of the quilt, the name of the quilter, and the quilter's phone number. (One quilt per pillowcase.) Quilts must be dropped off at designated drop-off person; quilts must be picked up by the submitter at Queeny Park at the end of the show.
- he Charity Raffle proceeds will go to Fisher House. The quilt committee will visit the Fisher House this Saturday.
- Margie Whitehead and Lynn DeWitt are putting together the brown bag raffle of notions and fabric and completed projects; please clean your sewing room and donate pristine or gently-used but unwanted items to the brown bag raffle.

Program/Challenge Awards: The Sewing Machine Quilting winner was Carole Lovelace. The Long-Arm Computer-Aided Quilting prize was won by Judy Vogt. The winner of Free-Motion Long-Arm Quilting was Patricia Hill. And Debbie Ernst won the Challenge for Hand Quilting. Each of the winners received a prize from the Guild for winning the Challenge. Each of the quilts was a work of art and our quilters should be proud of their work.

Membership: Kathy Chitwood and Dot Branson presented two attendance prizes. There were 8 guests, and 84 members present at the meeting this evening.

Additional Announcements: Candy Grisham announced that the Art Bits Group has their Totems Exhibit at Bluebird Park in Ellisville through 4 November.

A TOUR OF THE FISHER HOUSE

Members of the Quilt Show Committee, Nancy Peters, Iris Moor, Tamra Phelps, Margie Whitehead, Sandy Rekowski and I had the pleasure of taking a tour of Fisher House, our chosen charity for the Fanfare of Quilts 2020 Raffle today. Frank Ewing, MSgt. USAF (Ret), is the Assistant Manager and welcomed us and gave us a great background in the mission of Fisher House and how they serve our Veterans and their families.

Fisher House was founded by Zachary and Elizabeth Fisher when Elizabeth found that veteran's families were sleeping in the lobbies of hospitals and in their cars as their loved ones were cared for in veteran facilities. The Fishers, a well known construction family, built the first Fisher House with their construction knowledge and set up a foundation for



future homes to support the families of veterans, while the veteran is receiving care at a VA facility. There are 85 Fisher House facilities, mainly in the US, but also in Europe. Neither Zachary or Elizabeth served in the armed forces, they just saw a need and fulfilled it. Zachary is only one of two Honorary Admirals in the US. The other is Bob Hope. That gives you an idea of how important this work is to our military personnel and families.

Fisher House is where the family or caretaker of the veteran will stay while the veteran is in the hospital. However, if the veteran has out patient services, the veteran can also stay there with the care taker. The funds to built Fisher House are 50% raised by the Board of Directors and that is matched by the government. The employees that work there, work for the government but donations, like ours, are used to supply the house with things like internet, computers, food, videos, books, games, etc...

Fisher House is set up like most homes; large living room, family room, kitchen and dining area. Fisher House in St. Louis is a little unique as it overlooks the beautiful Mississippi River and they have positioned the house so that the patio has the most gorgeous view. (No pictures of this as it was a rainy overcast type of morning!).

Attached are pictures of us with the statue of The Fisher's in the entry way of the facility, as we toured the kitchen and one of the rooms. All of the spaces are set up to serve the needs of the families that stay there. What I found more important than that was the attitude of Frank and the rules of the Foundation that take in to account the mental state that many of these families must be in during these difficult times. Frank has an honest open heart and compassion for the people that come through the doors. He believes in his purpose to take care of and care for the families, no matter what their mental state.



The Foundation has set up many rules, as any organization like this would need. The one that really stuck out to me was that eating is only allowed in the dining area. You might think this is to keep the house clean and free of bugs. Although I am positive this is a great side benefit, it's really about building community. They believe that the relationships and friendships that can build between the families that stay there, actually add to the healing of the veteran and family members. That sense of community is built through shared meal times and coming together in a space made for them.

The care and compassion that it requires to run a place like this is more important than the money. I left there realizing that the few dollars that we can raise with our raffle will support their grocery bill for one trip to the grocery store. However, showing support from our quilting community to our veteran community is the bigger gift. I hope that these pictures and my attempt at describing what we saw will help you consider what you might be able to donate to the raffle, as well as partaking in the raffle.

I believe that Frank will be joining us at the show for some of the show hours. I hope you get to meet him and see the love and compassion he has for his mission at Fisher House.

THE MISSOURI QUILT MUSEUM OPENS

Visitors to Quilt Town, USA, have yet another attraction to visit when they come to Hamilton, Missouri.

Phase One of the Missouri Quilt Museum located in Hamilton, MO, opened on Monday, September 23rd. The Phase One opening includes the *Quilt Town USA Exhibit*, quilts from the Delbert Godsey Vintage Quilt collection and quilts from the museum's own growing collection.

The opening also include other exhibits and collections as well as a partial display of the world's largest collection of toy sewing machines.

Museum spokesperson Dakota Redford said "We are fortunate to have some of the world's best quilters right here in NW Missouri. We felt it was only appropriate that we open the museum with an exhibit that features the tremendous amount of local quilting talent."

The Quilt Town USA exhibit will feature quilts from well known area quilters including Jenny Doan, Courtenay Hughes, Cindy Morris, Janice Richardson, Jenn Sweem, Liz Gubernatis, Annette Ashbach, the Yamamoto Family, the Burnett Family and the Doan Family.

The museum is housed in the historic, 100 year-old Hamilton High School Building. "Being 100 years old, the building requires extensive renovation and upgrading," Redford said. "Due to the costs and time involved, we decided to open the museum in phases. Phase One includes areas that were added to the school in later years and required less upgrading."

Redford said that Phase Two of the museum is scheduled to open in the spring of 2020. Phase Two will include the National Quilt Museum Gallery and will feature rotating exhibits from the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, Kentucky. "We are extremely pleased to partner with the National Quilt Museum in order to bring some of the best quilt exhibits in the world to NW Missouri."

Upon completion, the museum will feature four full galleries, numerous exhibits and various hands-on areas. "We are not a typical quilt museum," Redford said. "MQM will tell the story of quilting in North America from the time of the pilgrims up to today's digital quilting processes. There will be a number of historical exhibits and many opportunities for visitors to participate with hands on projects and demonstrations.

Already on the museum grounds is the world's tallest spool of thread. Standing over 22 feet tall, the spool of thread was started with 1,000,000 yards of thread donated by Aurifil Company. Visitors have the opportunity to add their own thread to the spool.

The Missouri Quilt Museum is located at 300 N. Bird Street in Hamilton. Museum hours are 11:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Tuesday thru Saturday. The museum is closed Sundays and Mondays. For more information contact: Dakota Redford 435-849-2564.
